Film Review

For the films listed as sources, you must complete the following requirements: a typed, at least one page response, using MLA format, and vocabulary requirements.

Short Answer Question #1

Give a brief summary of the film. Name the director and discuss his/hers choice of costume, scenery, language, and plot development. Include important citations that you can use in your essay.

Short Answer Question #2

How does this film, it may just be a particular scene, relate to your life? Provide specific examples/citations from the film and specific examples from your life.

Short Answer Question #3

How does this film connect with our unit theme of **survival**? Give specific examples, with citations, to prove the theme exists. How does it relate to *Lord of the Flies*?

TP-CASTT

T-Title: The meaning of the title without reference to the poem.

P- Paraphrase: Put the poem, line by line, in your own words. DO NOT READ INTO THE POEM. Only read on surface level.

C- Connotation: Look for deeper meaning (symbolism, imagery, similes, metaphors, mood, punctuation, rhyme scheme, etc.)

A- Attitude: Look for the author's tone. How is the writer speaking?

S- Shifts: Look for shifts in tone, action, and rhythm. How do these affect the poem?

T- Title: Reevaluate the title as it pertains to the poem

T- Theme: What does the poem mean? What is it saying? How does it relate to life? How does it relate to other sources?

You will submit a typed response along with the lyrics of the song. Each letter should be a new paragraph in your written response.

For Poems

Please include the writer and publisher of the poem.

You will submit a typed response along with the actual poem. Each letter should be a new paragraph in your written response.
